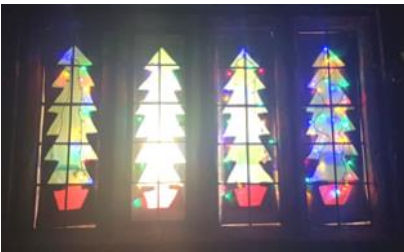

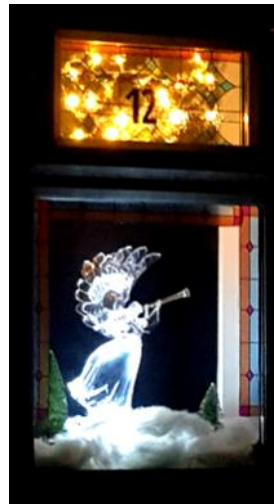
Advent windows a triumph!

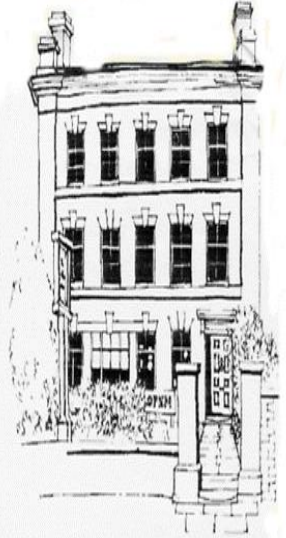

Newbottle & Charlton School Update

It was lovely to welcome local residents to the school for our Community Tea. The children sang some Christmas songs and the Year 6s enjoyed serving tea and cake and biscuits made by

two of our classes. Our next one will be around Easter time (see village calendar for all the dates).

The school EYFS and Key Stage 1 Nativity was a great success. It was called 'A little Bird Told Me', about a Bird who travelled to see the Baby Jesus and met Angels, shepherds and kings on the way.

The services for Christingle (despite the addition of a bat flying in the church during one of the songs) and Christmas went well and the singing was beautiful.

It was lovely to see so many at our Mini Christmas Fayre. It was a great way to end our term. Thanks to the Year 6s, staff and PTFA for their supporting running different stalls.

We also said farewell to the amazing Mrs Hawes, who retired after 26 years at Charlton school. We celebrated her time at school with a special assembly which included a school song about her, a poem from staff and pupils and some lovely cards and gifts from pupils, parents, staff and governors. We will miss her lots! On the first day back on Thursday 4th January we have our Epiphany service at 9:30am, which you are welcome to join.

We are going on a whole school trip to Peterborough cathedral on the Friday 5th, which we do every 4 years as we are part of the Peterborough diocese.

Oak class (Year R) will enjoy a workshop called 'Songs and Stories', exploring the cathedral for the first time and taking part in hands-on story session, discovering music used in worship and creating a 'make' to take back to school.

Ash class (Year 1 and 2) will explore the building using their senses, giving them an understanding of how Christians worship in the cathedral. They will also look at sculpting symbols in the cathedral before making a decorated clay tile to take back to school.

Elm class (Year 3 and 4) will be in a workshop called 'Searching for Saxons' which links to their new topic about the Saxons. They will focus on the Cathedral's Saxon past, its archaeology, writing and artwork, looking at some of the old artefacts.

Birch class (Year 5 and 6) will be looking at 'Tudors, Monks and Monarchs'. This will support their learning about the Tudors at the beginning of the year. They will visit the tomb of Katherine of Aragon and discover more about her life through role play and then look at Tudor Rebuses in the cathedral before making their own to take back to school.

We are looking forward to it!

NEWBOTTLE PARISH COUNCIL (NOV 2023 UPDATE)

Fly Tipping — If residents are aware of any fly tipping, please report this to West Northamptonshire Council. They will collect the rubbish and also gather evidence, which will then help them prosecute the offenders.

Myers Close Play Area — Quotes will be obtained for new play equipment and surfacing in the play area.

Playing Field & Pavilion — The Parish Council supports the submission of a planning application for a new pavilion. This will now need to be agreed by the Trust who owns the playing field, before submission to the Local Planning Authority. The PFA is constantly in touch with Brackley Athletic FC to address parking issues on match days.

Budget & Precept 2024/2025 — The budget for 2024/2025 has been approved and the precept will be increased by £2000 to £16,000. This increase will be used for the street lighting and play equipment projects.

Community Bus Service — A community bus service was being run from the village to Brackley, Northampton, Banbury and Towcester. For more information, please call 'Ability' on 01327 604123.

Street Lighting Project — A quote from Eon for the second phase of the project, which includes Myers Way and Myers Close is still awaited.

Broken Street Lights — If any street lights are not working, please contact the Clerk to the Parish Council with the lamp number/location and this information will be forwarded to Eon. Please bear in mind that the street lighting contract is between the Parish Council and Eon, so if residents contact Eon directly, they may not get a response

Traffic Issues on Farthinghoe Road — West Northants Council will not support 20mph speed restrictions in the village. However the Parish Council is able to erect advisory 20mph signs and will also change the VAS to flash 20mph instead of 30mph. The Parish Council does not have the funds to match-fund £25,000 for chicanes. WNC will be requested to progress double yellow lines on the corners of Myers Way and Farthinghoe Road to help address the parking issues and also erect a mirror opposite this junction to assist drivers pulling out of Myers Way.

Grass Cutting — Mick Dempsey has been awarded the grass cutting contract for 2024/2025.

Community Speed Watch Scheme — Newbottle Parish Council would like to start a Community Speed Watch Scheme in the village, but it will need support from volunteers in the community for it to be a success. The reason for this extended celebration is that it demonstrates the crucial importance of the birth of Christ to the history of the world.

We sometimes hear an event being described as a turning point for humanity. Occasionally this is true, but sometimes an event that seems important is forgotten within a generation. This is not so with the birth of Jesus Christ. The movement that began with that event still attracts billions of followers around the world. The reason for this can be summarised by saying that without the birth of Christ there would have been no crucifixion and resurrection at Easter, and without the resurrection humanity would have no hope of eternal life. That life, the greatest gift of all, can be unlimited and infinite is the most remarkable and hopeful message that Christianity conveys. One to put in your diary now is our '**Springfest**', which will take place between **Saturday 16th and Sunday the 24th March**. 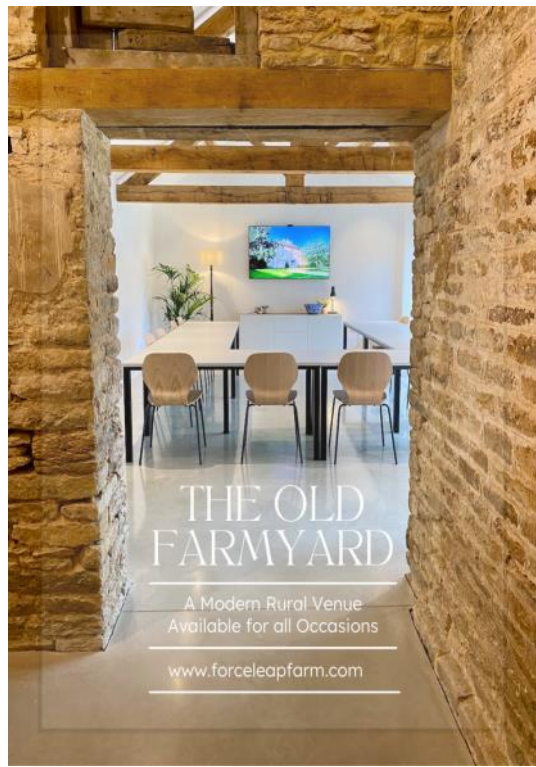
