

As part of our Easter celebrations the children learned all about the importance of this festival to Christians in RE and through our daily acts of worship which included a special service at St James'. The children also took part in our annual Easter Egg hunt in school and were given an Easter egg kindly donated by the PTFA. Children had the opportunity to decorate an egg or create an Easter bonnet as part of a competition run by the PTFA.

Playing Field Update

The appendices that accompany the business plan have now been compiled, so the final document is ready.

Nature Notes

We are writing this at the end of the Easter weekend when we have had beautiful warm sunny weather. It was a joy to be in the garden and we have had a lot of butterflies, not only the Brimstones which we saw first in March, but also a lot of Orange-tips. These are easily distinguished as their name describes them, though the females don't carry that distinctive orange splash at the ends of the wings so we never know whether we see them as well. The females have black wingtips, which makes them rather like small white butterflies; but both sexes of Orange-tips have mottled green underwings which are lacking in the Small White. Orange-tips lay their eggs on some of the cruciferous plants and are particularly keen on Garlic Mustard (*Alliaria petiolare*). This grows as a weed in this garden, but we had never had much of it until the last couple of years, when it seems to be everywhere. We now wonder whether the ready availability of this good food plant has increased the number of butterflies. They also like cuckooflowers (*Cardamine pratensis*) which grows in dampish places, hence the butterfly's Latin name *Anthocharis cardamines*.

This is the noisiest time of year for bird song, when birds are busting themselves to attract a mate and claim good feeding territories. We are not very good at identifying bird song – when you can hear it as often as not you can't see it. There are a few that we know: at the moment there is a very insistent Great Tit with his repetitive call of 'Teacher! Teacher!'. Magpies chitter-chatter in the wood; when we have a green woodpecker in the garden and it flies off you can understand why the old country name was 'Yaffle' – they do yaffle. Our sparrows are very argumentative between themselves and very noisy – but you couldn't call it 'song'. We've seen Yellowhammers along the church path hedge this year but haven't heard their very distinctive song – 'A little bit of bread and <u>no</u> cheese!'

It wasn't until the end of the 19th century that ornithologists began to ring birds, and this made it possible to work out where our summer visitors went to in the autumn. That great naturalist, Gilbert White, spent a good deal of time in the 18th century trying to find the hiding places where swallows hibernated in winter. But in 1912 a UK-ringed swallow turned up in South Africa to everyone's amazement - no-one had thought it possible that small birds could fly so far; UK-ringed Manx shearwaters were found off the coast of Brazil and Argentina, and UK-ringed Arctic Terns in Antarctica and Australia. It became apparent that not only did birds migrate to and from Europe, but seasonal waves of birds ebbed and flowed all round the globe. Analysis has shown that there are eight major 'flyways' around the world, and the UK is on the East Atlantic Flyway. This bird superhighway has millions of birds flying there and back along it every year, and like any highway, it has service stations – places to rest and refuel. In the UK many of these pit stops are RSPB reserves, particularly wetlands with rich and diverse ecosystems, but it is obvious that for bird populations to flourish, the rest of their 'flyways' should remain bird-friendly too, meaning that international co-operation is needed.

We wrote last month about finding a dead fox in the garden. This time we met a very live fox – it was trotting along a high wall behind our greenhouse and, startled by humans, leapt down in front of us – a very large jump – and made its way off. It was probably checking out our compost heaps, which now have meagre pickings as all our food waste goes into a rat-proof hotbin.

Cattle in the fields

As you may have noticed the cattle are out grazing again. Please remember that cattle can be unpredictable and can therefore pose a risk to those in their fields especially dog walkers. We make every effort to manage the risk by choosing breeds with a docile reputation, culling aggressive individuals, employing skilled stockmen and managing the cattle's grazing so that cows at most risk of being aggressive are not grazed in fields with public foot paths and bridleways in.

The cows are at their most protective and so pose the biggest risk for a couple of weeks after calving, so we keep calves for the first couple of weeks in grass fields with no public access. To avoid any problems the best policy is to stick to the foot paths (we can then anticipate that you might be there) and keep your dog on a lead whenever you are crossing any grass field. If you are nervous, it is fine by us to walk around the edge of the field near the fence, so you don't have to walk through a group of cattle.

If you do get chased by cattle, let go of the lead as the cow will probably be chasing the dog rather than you (the dog is far more likely to get away if it is not attached to you) and get out of the field as quickly as possible.

Finally, probably the greatest danger posed by cattle to local people is if they get out onto the road. This happens several times a year and is nearly always because someone has left a gate open. Please save us a great deal of stress and help us reduce the risks posed by straying cattle on the road, by making sure your whole group closes all gates properly when you go through them.

Please try to stick to countryside code:

- \Rightarrow Keep on the foot path
- \Rightarrow Keep your dogs under control
- \Rightarrow Close any gates you open
- \Rightarrow Move quietly through the countryside
- \Rightarrow Keep away from stock
