Charlton Panto whopping success!


Wow! We may have had to wait an extra year, but the Panto was really worth waiting for. We received lots of positive feedback from audiences.

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
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

It is sometimes said that the best thing to happen to television was the Coronation of our late Queen. Prior to 1953 comparatively few people owned a TV set, and yet 27 million people watched the service from Westminster Abbey with, on average, 17 people watching each set. Thereafter sales of televisions really took off and, as the saying goes, we have never looked back.

However, as we watch the Coronation of our new King, I suspect there will be a little looking back to the past. The Coronation is an ancient service, and so it is inevitable that commentators will compare this one with previous coronations. It is wrong to suppose that the service is preserved in aspic, never changing. In fact, it has been 'tweaked' repeatedly over centuries.

Nevertheless, some elements remain unchanged. It is a national ceremonial occasion when those of all faiths, or none, can acknowledge the new Sovereign, but at its heart it is also a Christian act of worship. Two elements in particular convey this character. The first is when the monarch is anointed with Holy Oil and the second is when he makes his Communion.

The oil for this Coronation comes from olives harvested from the Mount of Olives, near Jerusalem, a familiar backdrop for many of the events recorded in the New Testament of the Bible.

Despite all the pomp and grandeur of the occasion, in these two parts of the service the Monarch comes before God with no more exalted status than you or I. Indeed, to make this point he is divested of his regalia before he is anointed and merely wears a plain white garment. This is because he is acknowledging that he cannot live up to his calling without the grace of God. The same applies to us all, and that is why anointing with Holy Oils and Holy Communion are available in the humblest parish church as well as in the splendour of the Abbey. Anointing and Communion are sacraments, that is gifts from God, given to His Church by which we can be sure we are receiving God's grace to strengthen us to live the life God has given us.

To celebrate the Coronation we are having a service of Evensong in the parish church. It will be at 6pm on Sunday 7th May. Do come along. We are also inviting you to suggest the hymns we might sing at that service. I can't promise we will be able include all suggestions, but we'd welcome your requests. Do drop me a line at the email address below, or ring me and tell me what you'd like to sing.

Nature Notes

Spring is late this year and we saw no butterflies at all in March. Usually we have seen the first brimstones flying by the end of the month. We had some lovely warm weather for the Easter weekend at the beginning of April, and then we saw Brimstones, a Small Tortoiseshell, a Comma, an Orange Tip, a Holly Blue and a Peacock. The Holly Blue is the small blue butterfly that you may see early in the year. Confusingly, though it is a small blue butterfly (and its wings are blue on both sides) it is not The Small Blue, the underside of whose wings is brownish.

We seem to write about the loss of wildlife and climate change quite a lot, which is all bad news, but driving down to Oxford last week it was a joy to see large areas along the verges with thousands of cowslips coming into flower. Motorway verges obviously suit them as they are protected from trampling, grazing and picking, and as long as they have managed to flower and set seed before an annual haircut they will continue to flourish and increase. Cowslip wine used to be commonly made in the country, and the recipes for cowslip wine start by picking 'a bushel of cowslips'. A bushel is an old-fashioned measure of volume, containing 4 pecks or 8 gallons (though there were local variations): malted barley, beans, grains of various sorts were measured out in bushels. This is the sort of volume you might get in an old-fashioned laundry basket - so that's a lot of cowslips. At the time when cowslip wine was being made, there were so many that there were plenty for everyone, but that sort of harvest can't have done their survival any favours, and the loss of 'unimproved' pasture and hay meadows in the 20th century reduced their possible habitats, leaving them only odd unsprayed corners. There are a few in the Stonepits field, and we have some in the garden. It was exciting to see that one had made itself at home in the middle of the lawn and we shall have to move it somewhere safer. It is also likely that the cowslips now flowering are less impressive than those of a hundred years ago: inevitably if you were picking your bushel of cowslips you would go for the biggest and best. Only the smallest would be left to set seed for the future.

Some years ago a friend who had a bit of woodland collected a lot of cowslip seed and gave us an envelope full. We sowed it in a seed tray and nothing happened at all. The seed tray got left in a cold frame and occasionally watered and lo and behold, a full eighteen months later they came up like mustard and cress. It is their descendants that we have in the garden now.

We have some Pasque flowers (*Anemone pulsatilla*) in a stony place and they have just come out – late. They are called Pasque flowers because they are normally out at Easter time and it is surprising how often they are. This is a rare wild flower in this country: we have seen them growing wild in the Hills and Holes, the old quarry, at Barnack near Peterborough.

The RSPB's Big Garden Birdwatch this year highlighted the continuing decline of all sorts of birds. 1.5 m sparrows were seen in gardens in January this year, but this figure is down by 60% since the survey began in 1979. The RSPB gives a round figure of a loss of 38m birds from our skies in the past 50 years. Parliament passed the Environment Act into law in 2021: this requires a halt to species decline by 2030, but unless serious action is taken it will not be possible to meet that deadline.

MINUTES OF THE NEWBOTTLE AND CHARLTON ANNUAL PARISH MEETING HELD ON MONDAY 17 APRIL 2023 AT THE MEMORIAL HALL, CHARLTON AT 7.30PM

PRESENT: Chairman, Councillor Michael Loggin; Councillors Linda Baker, Kevin Ridge, Wayne Rule and Matthew Walsh.

ALŚO IN ATTENDANCE: Theresa Goss (Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer), District Councillors Rebecca Breese and Rosie Herring and two members of the public. **APOLOGIES:** Parish Councillor Struan Kenton.

- 1. **MINUTES** The minutes of the meeting held on 7 May 2022 were agreed as a correct record and signed by the Chairman.
- 2. **MATTERS ARISING** There were no matters arising from the minutes of the meeting held on 7 May 2022.
- 3. **REPORTS FROM DISTRICT COUNCILLORS** Prior to the meeting, a report from the District Councillors had been circulated to the Parish Council and the meeting. District Councillor Rosie Herring highlighted the Integrated Care System and one of her main priorities had been to address the lack of support which was available for young people with mental health issues. There was also a discussion about traffic issues in Charlton and the number of accidents on rural roads. WNC also had a new app which provided lots of information for residents, as well as the ability to report issues to WNC, such as potholes and comment on consultations.

Councillor Rebecca Breese also highlighted issues relating to planning matters in the village and the surrounding area.

District Councillors Rebecca Breese and Rosie Herring were thanked for their reports.

4. **OPEN FORUM** – The Chairman invited representatives from village organisations to provide a report on the work they had been undertaking in the village.

There were reports from the Memorial Hall Management Committee, Pre-School, Playing Field Association, Charlton Panto Players and Northants Police. The reports were available on the Parish Council web site.

The Chairman thanked everyone for their reports.

5. **CHAIRMAN'S REPORT** – The Chairman of the Parish Council, Michael Loggin, reported on the work of the Parish Council during 2022/2023.

Councillor Loggin thanked the Councillors and the Clerk & Responsible Financial Officer, for their work over the last 12 months.


The Chairman's full report was available on the Parish Council web site.
