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Nature Notes

We recently spent a week in the Bavarian Alps looking mainly at wild alpine flowers but also identifying butterflies and birds as well. On one walk we found a group of about a dozen small butterflies, mainly Grizzled Skippers and Dingy Skippers, with a couple of Small Blues as well, all clustered together on a very stony path. What were they after? It seemed likely that a dog had passed that way and left its mark not long before, and the butterflies were feasting on the minerals this had released onto the path. Apparently the fossil record, which reveals the millions of years of evolutionary development that predate us, shows that butterflies evolved before flowering plants did. We all know of butterflies feeding on the nectar of flowers – think buddleia bushes with their attendant Peacocks and Red Admirals in August – but if butterflies were around before flowers, they must have fed on something, and it seems that what they survived on was minerals, from the ground or from other sources. We have before now seen a Peacock butterfly feeding on dog poo, and Purple Emperors are known to descend from the heights of trees, their normal habitat, to feast on animal excrement.

Going back to the long evolutionary development of the tree of life, when flowering plants appeared butterflies found an exciting new source of calorie-rich nourishment in the flowers' nectar, but they obviously still need some minerals and take them when they can. Both the Grizzled Skipper and the Dingy Skipper are rare in this country (but we saw a Grizzled Skipper in Ardley Quarry last summer), so it was exciting to see a number of them, and we also saw several Camberwell Beauties (though it seemed odd to be calling them Camberwell Beauties in Bavaria). This is a rare migrant arrival in Britain, but has not been known to breed here. It is a large and handsome darkish butterfly with a very distinctive white border all round the wings.

In the Alps we saw lots of alpine flowers, and it is always exciting to find the flowers that we grow with care in the garden, just growing wild in the meadow grass, or across stony slopes. We saw masses of Primula auricula, true Oxlips, Lady's Mantle (in variety), alpine Gentians, Trollius (Globe flowers) and much, much more. Possibly the most exciting was the day during which we saw so many clumps of Lady's Slipper Orchids in full flower that we were positively blasé about them by the end. This is Britain's rarest plant, reduced to one site in the Yorkshire Dales by the end of last century, though there is now a programme to reintroduce it and increase the number of plants and sites, in order to maximize its chances of survival.

It is rather less stunning, but it was still a pleasure to see a Pyramidal orchid in the Stonepits field where we have found it before. The stonepits are about to be awash with the yellow of Lady's Bedstraw, and there is already a good deal of Bird's Foot Trefoil or Eggs and Bacon, spreading low to the ground.

We have been introduced to a brilliant bird-song identification app for a smart phone, called Merlin, which is run by Cornell University. It listens to what is going on and lists which birds are singing, flashing up those singing at that very moment. This has added an extra layer of interest to the morning round of the garden with the dog. So far it has listed all the birds that we knew we had: robin, wren, blackbirds, tits in variety, pigeons, jackdaws, sparrows, starlings, an occasional carrion crow, greenfinches, chaffinches. But it has also suggested a blackcap and a dunnock, and a spotted flycatcher which we've certainly never seen. We're awaiting an ornithologist friend to tell us if we really have those.

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
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Newottle & Charlton School Update

What a busy and hot day we had! As usual, everyone enjoyed the tractor and trailer rides and being able to climb in and out of the machinery, especially the combine. The sheep looked particularly grateful to the shearers as their heavy fleeces were sheared off.



I was particularly grateful to some of the professionals who help me manage the farm, for volunteering their time to talk about

their role on the farm. This included the farm vet, agronomist and beekeepers. We also had our pop-up café selling ice creams and cold drinks and Smith and Clay put on a BBQ and Pavement Coffee came with their van.
