Playground Passes Safety Inspection

In July, the playground at the Village Hall was inspected by RoSPA to ensure that the equipment and surrounding area meet the required health and safety requirements. The report mainly highlighted only low levels of risk across the playground (which is what we want!) and a handful of medium risk items that we will address.

This excellent result wouldn't have been possible without the help of our volunteers who have given up evenings and weekends to ensure that the playground remains safe for the children that use it. The Trustees would like to thank; Andrew Beadle, Phil & Evan Wolfe, Kevin Ridge, Tim Collins, Wayne Rule, Alex Lomas, Ian Jones, John Snelling, Jay Naylor and Tom Phillips for all their hard work over the last 12 months.

Moving forward, we will be setting up regular maintenance dates from April to June to make sure the playground remains in tip top condition and we need more volunteers - especially parents of children who use the park - to help, even if it's just for an hour or two.

Notes of the Newbottle Parish Council Meeting Monday 18 July 2022 at the Memorial Hall, Charlton www.newbottleparishcouncil.co.uk

Present – Parish Councillors Linda Baker, Mark Bracey, Struan Kenton and Kevin Ridge. Theresa Goss (Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer) and three members of the public.

Vacancy – Following the resignation of Phil Marshall, there is a vacancy on the Parish Council. If anyone is interested in joining, please contact the Clerk. new-bottleparishcouncil@yahoo.co.uk or 01295 710965.

The Parish Council expressed its thanks to Phil for all his work during his time as a Councillor.

Playing Field and Pavilion – The Parish Council received a report on the progress with the project and it had currently stalled because changes were required to the Lease, between the Parish Council and the Trust, to enable grant funding to be accessed.

This matter would be chased up with Spratt Endicott and it was also agreed that the Parish Council would meet the legal costs for the changes to the Lease, match fund £3000 for the works to the perimeter footpath around the playing field and support the current Working Group to become the Playing Field Association (PFA), which would operate as a Sub-Committee of the Parish Council.

Post Office and Village Shop – At the current time, the shop and Post Office would remain closed as a solution had not been found to enable a re-opening.

Community Bus Service – A community bus service was being run from the village to Brackley, Northampton, Banbury and Towcester. For more information, please call 'Ability' on 01327 604123.

Library Bus Shelter – The Library in the Green Lane Bus Shelter is continuing. Thank you to Jenny Barker for organising this.

Flagpole – Investigations would be made into a flag pole for the village and it would be discussed further at the next meeting.

Street Lighting – A quote from Eon was accepted for replacing the current street lights with LED lights. These changes were required because the bulbs which were used in the street lights had now become obsolete.

If any street lights are not working, please contact the Clerk to the Parish Council with the lamp number/location and this information will be forwarded to Eon. Please bear in mind that the street lighting contract is between the Parish Council and Eon, so if residents contact Eon directly, they may not get a response.

Fly Tipping – If residents are aware of any fly tipping, please report this to West Northamptonshire Council. https://www.southnorthants.gov.uk/report or call 0300 126 7000. They will collect the rubbish and also gather evidence, which will then help them prosecute the offenders.

Parking Issues – The Parish Council kindly requests that drivers do not park their vehicles on the footpaths in the village. Parking on footpaths means that pedestrians and especially those with pushchairs or wheelchairs have to move into the road to get past the vehicle. This is clearly very dangerous and residents should not be putting other residents in this dangerous position, especially when everyone is so aware of the speeding issues through the village. **Please park considerately in the village.**

Nature Notes

At the time of writing we are in the middle of a heatwave, with extreme heat and drought. The grass in the garden is entirely brown, feeling crunchy underfoot instead of soft, except for a patch at the bottom where we think there is some water underground and the soil seems to remain dampish. The grass does tend to look as if it is entirely dead, but one good rain and it greens up in no time.

There is rather a lot about butterflies this month. We hope that lots of you will be doing the Big Butterfly Count which is taking place now: there is still time to participate as it continues until 7th August. You can sign up at bigbutterflycount.org, where you will find an ID sheet, and then spend 15 minutes in the sunshine in a garden, park or field headland. This is another large-scale citizen science project which enables lepidoptera experts to get an overview of how butterflies are doing across the whole country. There ae many anecdotal reports of the lack of butterflies buddleia bushes used to be covered in them in July and August - but when many thousands of reports are entered into Butterfly Conservation's interactive map a fuller picture can emerge. Last year record numbers of butterfly counts were submitted (over 150,000), but they recorded the lowest average number of butterflies (nine per count) since the survey began in 2010. Half of Britain's 58 resident butterfly species are threatened or near-threatened with extinction, while even the 'common' species like the small tortoiseshell are becoming rarer. Our count, done in the garden on 17th July at 11am in sunny warm weather, was as follows: 5 Meadow Browns, 7 Small Whites, 3 Small Tortoiseshells, 5 Peacocks, 2 Commas, 3 Large Whites, 1 Brimstone, 4 Gatekeepers, 1 Ringlet, 1 Green-Veined White. This seemed like a good tally.

We also take part in an annual butterfly survey of the wider countryside for Butterfly Conservation, once in July and once in August. Our allotted patch covers Forceleap and the edge of Hinton airfield and we walk two stretches of 1 kilometre recording all the butterflies we see. The results are fed into another national database which enables Butterfly Conservation to judge how butterflies are faring. On the afternoon of 13th July, in three-quarters of an hour, we saw 10 Large Whites, 13 Small Whites, 14 Marbled Whites, 62 Meadow Browns, 20 Gatekeepers, 24 Ringlets, 2 Small Heaths, 2 Small Tortoiseshells, 2 Peacocks, 10 Small Skippers and -- a real rarity -- 1 Dark Green Fritillary. Altogether a good result.

Some of the difficulties faced by butterflies may be due to climate change: it may be that butterflies are emerging earlier because of the warmer climate, and then they are out of sync with the plants that they need both to feed on and to lay their eggs on. But probably their decline is mostly due to habitat loss and the use of chemicals.

We are having real problems with the incursions of unwelcome wildlife into the garden. We think it was the muntjac deer that ate half of the broad bean plants and then quite a lot of the bean pods on the remaining plants; we think it was deer that nibbled off the first courgettes just when we thought there would be a picking for us; but was it the badgers or the deer that stripped all the ripening plums off the low-hanging branches of the plum tree? Luckily there are plenty left for us higher up out of reach.


